LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

Mary's Place stands on the lands and waters of the Coast Salish; the Duwamish, Muckleshoot, Suguamish, Tulalip, and Puyallup. The Coast Salish have resided here since time immemorial and are the original stewards of these lands and waters. Today, many Indigenous people continue to live and thrive in this place.



WHO WE SERVE



At Mary's Place, our focus on mitigating the devastating impact of structural racism on the lives of the people we serve is grounded in data.

Our data tells us that 88% of the families we serve are families of color. High percentages of our families are of African descent, and specifically single Black mothers with children. Our data reflects King County public health data, which shows that communities of color, particularly Black adults, are evicted 5.5 more times than white adults. Indeed, Black adults in King County represent 28% of homeless

households receiving services in the homeless system—more than quadruple their percentage of the King County population.

Our equity efforts at Mary's Place are an attempt to disrupt and dismantle structural racism as it shows up in the lives of our families. We know that having staff who reflects the communities we serve is foundational to a high level of care. Sixty-five percent of Mary's Place staff identifies as Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, and many staff have life experiences and expertise that enrich services and inform our advocacy.

Our equity work moved forward this year with the addition of our Chief Equity and Policy Officer, Dr. Damarys Espinoza. Dr. Damarys, together with equity consultants Sankofa, and our Mary's Place Equity Workgroup are working to move forward the development of an equity framework and theory of change for the organization. We're excited to introduce and begin implementing that plan early next year.





THREE-PRONGED APPROACH

Mary's Place is working to end family homelessness with three interdependent approaches—by providing emergency shelter and resources for families who are outside with nowhere to go, and helping families at risk of losing their homes BEFORE that happens.

Rents continue to rise, and affordable housing is hard to find. As a result, families are staying longer in shelter and the number of families who are outside with nowhere to go continues to rise.

The King County Emergency Family Shelter Intake Line, operated by Mary's Place, receives on average 50-60 calls a day. Due to a lack of shelter capacity, we are only able to offer a shelter bed to just two or three, prioritizing the most vulnerable.

Mary's Place is working to end family homelessness with three interdependent approaches:



Providing emergency family shelter and resources in five 24/7 shelters with 720 beds across King County



Mobile outreach services that bring supplies and housing resources to unsheltered families in our community



Preventing homelessness with rental assistance and stability supports



In shelter, families find safety and stability, community, and resources to reduce the trauma of homelessness. We help them get back into permanent housing as quickly as possible.

Housing Services

Our Housing Specialists work with families to address financial and logistical barriers to housing so they can get back to enjoying family time and traditions in their own home as quickly as possible! With your support, 235 families moved from shelter into permanent housing last year!

Health Services

Mary's Place Health Services team, assisted by a network of volunteer health professionals and partnerships with health providers in the community, provides physical and behavioral health consultations, and helps families with insurance enrollment and primary care connections.



Youth Services

In Kids Club, families find age-appropriate enrichment programming for tots, children, and teens. We provide homework help and clubs, along with community outings and play time so that kids can be kids while their parents work on their housing goals.



Gemma and her mom arrived at shelter after fleeing a domestic violence situation. It was a stressful time for the family and Gemma, after missing several days of school, was reluctant to return and face her friends. The once active, engaged little girl became shy and timid.

Our youth services team invited Gemma to join the Girl Scout troop and it didn't take long for her to make new friends and come out of her shell. Gemma returned to school and staved active in Kids Club while her mom worked with Mary's Place housing specialists to get copies of documents to complete housing applications.



MOBILE OUTREACH



A critical part of our three-pronged approach is the work our mobile outreach team does in the community. Outreach specialists meet families where they are, living in cars and tents, or leaving hospitals, and provides supplies like food, clothing, and diapers, along with housing resources.

The Mary's Place Outreach Team works out of the Allen Family Center in South Seattle, where we partner with Navos, Mercy Housing, and BrightSpark to provide families with drop-in services for housing, childcare navigation, computer lab resources, and other supplies.



Sanara, Miguel, and their two boys lived in a mobile home park in South Seattle surrounded by friends and neighbors. The community was tight knit — parents watched over all the kids who played and went to school together. When the park was sold, the families were told they needed to vacate within 60 days—not enough time to find something they could afford and tearing apart the community. Like many of their neighbors, Sanara and Miguel moved their family into their car and lived nearby.

Word spread in the community about the Allen Family Center where the families could come inside to take showers, spend play time with the kids, and find housing resources. The Mary's Place Mobile Outreach Team visited them regularly in their car with supplies, food, and even a tent so they could spread out a bit.

Miguel and Sanara both had jobs and the outreach team was able to help them, and many others from their former neighborhood, move back into housing quickly, bypassing a stay in shelter.



Both shelter and outreach services are critical for addressing the acute needs of families with children who have lost their homes and are unsheltered. But unless we stop the flow of families into homelessness, the need will overwhelm our existing systems.

The third and most important prong of our approach is to prevent homelessness by keeping families in their hard-won homes with rental assistance and other stability supports. Prevention is effective; it ends the generational impacts of homelessness and the disproportionate impacts of homelessness on Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, and it is more cost effective than a stay in shelter.

Mary's Place has been piloting prevention since before the pandemic and we are just completing year one of a three-year study with the Lab for Economic Opportunity at the University of Notre Dame to determine and quantify the best way to implement rental assistance for long-term family stability.

But even now, we know that an effective strategy to end family homelessness must include a commitment to prevention strategies, and we will continue to advocate for a prevention-focused approach to family homelessness.





When Freddy and Laura found out they were expecting their first child they were excited to grow their family. Laura began having complications with her pregnancy that made it difficult for her to work. But Freddy was working, they were making ends meet. When businesses began to close in 2020, Freddy's hours were cut and the family couldn't afford to pay rent. It was a scary time, and they were relieved to find a place to weather the storm at Mary's Place. Within the year, they were back on their feet and in housing with new baby Jack.

A year later, with rent, gas, and food prices increasing due to escalating inflation—the family found themselves behind on rent and at risk of being evicted. The Mary's Place prevention program helped them pay their housing debt, get current with rent, and find free childcare for Jack so that Laura could go back to work—providing enough cushion for them to stabilize and stay in their hard-won home.
